Well, here we are in a second lock-down, hopefully it will have ended before Christmas.

Chairman Stepping Down – In our last edition of the Milton Malsor News, I told you that I would be stepping down at the May elections 2020, but due to Covid 19 this did not happen, however, I will be stepping down in May 2021.

Parish Council – The Parish Council has lost Alison Skillen as a member, she resigned at the beginning of September and we welcomed Katie Marshall as a new member at our November meeting. Kevin Flynn has also resigned, he stepped down at our October meeting due to a move out of the village in the New Year. The Parish Council will be able to replace Kevin shortly.

My thanks to Alison and Kevin for their work on the Parish Council.

Village Park – The back gate and fence have been repaired and we are awaiting more spare parts for the see-saw, it has proved to be somewhat problematic. A new casting is to be fitted to the 4 bay swing frame, and repairs to the raised mound and tunnel are ongoing.

New Dog Poo Bin – After several requests a new dog poo bin will be located on Rectory Lane near the entrance to the public footpath at the top of the High Street.

A polite reminder to dog owners who do not pick up after their dogs, after the new bin is installed there will be 7 dog poo bins located

around the village, there is no excuse for not cleaning up after your dog, it is an offence not to do so.

Gigaclear – Their work in the village is almost finished; the cabling ready for the installation of Fibre Optic superfast broadband has been installed up to the boundary of every house in the village. Milton Malsor Pooors' Trust



This charity started in the 18th century and has long since outlived its real purpose to provide bread and coal for the needy of the village at Christmas.

It is however hoped to keep this old custom alive.

There is a limited income, a small cash payment will again be made to beneficiaries. Eligibility is based on 'the poor'. This is interpreted to mean a pensioner over 65, unable to work due to sickness or reasonable cause and living in the village for at least 3 years.

Milton Malsor Historical Society.....

MILTON MALSOR - not just another village.....



Milton Malsor Historical Society has been stood down since January of this year, but it is anticipated we might be able to get back to some form of normality in the New Year and invite you to join our society.

Forever the optimist, one day Covid -19 could be history and it does no harm to occasionally remember the past - the various happenings and the 'goings on' of WW1 and WW2, for example to name but two.

Did you know during World War One?

- *A Zeppelin Airship dropped bombs near Milton*
- *Vast numbers of British troops passed through this area by train on their way to the south coast and onto Belgium*
- *Gas street lighting was turned off in Milton*
- *Several men from the village, some aged no more than 18/19 years volunteered to join the army; some never to return*

Did you also know during World War Two?

- *Enemy planes could be heard on their way to bomb Coventry after which the sky became red as the city began to burn*
- *Several incredibly young children from the London area were billeted for their safety, with families in the village*
- *Food rationing began in 1940 and continued until 1954, long after the war ended (the lack of tissues was not the biggest issue at the time!)*
- *German and Italian Prisoners of War were located within the area*
- *Many of our villagers not eligible for active service worked in various war factories*
- *Northampton and nearby Kislingbury suffered bomb damage*

- Wave after wave of Service men and their vehicles transited through this area moving south in support of the D Day Normandy Landings in France
- Many American and British military aerodromes, Silverstone included, were located throughout the Midlands and East Anglia
- In 1944, a Wellington Bomber crashed in Rothersthorpe - just ask Ken Johnson for the details who ran across the fields to the scene, although it comes as no surprise, he should have been in school at the time

On the 5th April 1944, a Wellington Bomber (designed by Dr Barnes Wallis during 1934 and Dam Busters fame) took off from Westcott, Buckinghamshire to fly to Otmoor on a training bomb run with a crew of five, two New Zealanders and three from the UK. Unfortunately, due to engine failure and the plane in flames, it flew over Milton and crashed at Poplars Farm, Rothersthorpe where it exploded, killing all the crew and their families left to grieve - being inevitably, the price of war.

The Milton Malsor Historical Society have had regular and enlightening meetings and very many interesting outside visits including Baddesley Clinton Hall and its priest hides and the Birmingham Assay Offices during the years, in fact since 2004. There is a slim chance our society might be able to start afresh with a meeting in the village hall maybe in the Spring of 2021. All our members and you would be welcome to attend as we would be pleased to see you. Hopefully, the Government Regulation of Self - distancing might have been relaxed a little, but there is no certainty at present. When it is possible for a meeting, a reminder will be issued for all to see, either in the various Milton Malsor Magazines or on the Notice Boards, so do come along if you can.

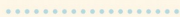
